I would not want to be a weather forecaster this time of year and their forecasts have been frustrating to me. Below, I describe three instances where the forecast impacted my decision to ride or to not ride.

First instance: We had a ride planned to the Feedmill Restaurant on 5/13. The forecast was calling for a significant chance of thunderstorms, so I decided to cancel the ride. Some folks met at Jerry's and decided to ride to a Dairy Queen in Maysville. They ended up riding with no rain. The only problem they had was they could not find a Dairy Queen in Maysville.

Second instance: We had our overnight ride planned to Sweetwater, Tennessee on 5/30 to 6/1. Jim needed to make the call by noon on Thursday and since the forecast at that time was calling for thunderstorms along our route for a large part of the day, we decided to cancel. Randy Hyde decided he was still going so Alan, Frank and Mitch decided to join him. I watched the weather forecast at 11:00 on Thursday night and it looked like we made the right decision because they were predicting thunderstorms. When I woke up on Friday and watched the forecasts, they showed that the worst of the weather would be east of us around 9:00. I decided to go with Randy and crew. We rode out of the rain just south of Nicholasville and the roads dried up before we had lunch in Somerset. We had a great time pre-riding the routes Jim planned for the trip. I hope we can put this ride back on the schedule in the future. Jim has scheduled it twice and the first one was canceled due to Hurricane Helene and the second one due to inaccurate forecasts. Hopefully the third time will be successful.

Third Instance: This past weekend, 6/6 to 6/7, the State had the Ride In hosted by Chapter Y. I had reservations at the Kentucky Dam Village Resort but once again the forecast kept changing as the date got closer. The various local forecasts in that area seemed to be showing that Thursday could have spotty rain and thunderstorms, Friday would be stormy, Saturday and Sunday would be dry. I was planning to ride until Wednesday night when the local forecasters said Saturday would also be stormy and Sunday would be dry. Based on that info, I decided to take my Jeep since it looked like I could ride there and return but might need to park the bike on Friday and Saturday due to storms.

As it turned out, that was a good decision because Karen rode down there with Dedre on Thursday and unfortunately, Dedre had to go home on Friday. She had planned to stay until after the closing on Saturday. Karen planned to ride home with Dedre on Saturday but when Dedre had to leave on Friday, Karen decided to stay with me. We ended up driving through part of The Land Between the Lakes on Friday and then went to a couple of nice wineries on Saturday. We weren't the only ones on 4 wheels, and I think everyone had a great time whether they were on 2, 3, or 4 wheels.

You might be wondering how accurate the weather forecast was. I did not get a drop of rain on Thursday. We had some thunderstorms Thursday night /early Friday morning. Friday, we had some storms hit prior to the rides. We had some heavy rain just after one of the groups returned. The second group wasn't as lucky and got back about 5 minutes too late and got caught in the heavy rain. We were under a tornado watch Friday afternoon until 8:00 PM. Saturday, we had some rain but no storms. The last forecasted dry day, Sunday, ended up being rainy until we got to the Bluegrass Parkway. If I had taken the bike, I would have been caught in the rain 3 out of the 4 days. Since Karen doesn't ride, I was glad I took the Jeep.

I guess I should not complain too much about the forecasts. In 2 of the 3 instances listed above, the decision worked out for me. Hopefully that trend will continue.

Chapter Y did an excellent job hosting the Ride In. The venue was very nice. They had planned 3 guided rides and 2 self-guided rides. They offered the same rides on Friday and Saturday, so everyone was able to participate in a ride each day. Karen and I took one of the self-guided rides on Friday but modified it since the return trip included several miles on US68. The big US68 Yard Sale was from 6/5 to 6/8, and we decided to avoid it. District Educator Report

With the return of favorable weather, most of us have gotten back to riding. Many of us like to ride in groups, enjoying the hobby we love with others of like mind. Group motorcycle riding is a philosophy that emphasizes a blend of safety, communication, and camaraderie while simultaneously requiring riders to be aware of their surroundings, to maintain proper spacing, and to communicate effectively. It is about riding as a team, where everyone relies on and respects each other to ensure a safe and enjoyable experience.

Here are some important points of group motorcycle riding philosophy:

Safety: proper spacing, staggered formations, and awareness of road conditions.

Communication: hand signals and CB/Bluetooth communication to alert other riders about changes in speed, direction, or potential hazards.

Responsibility: realizing that each rider is responsible for their own safety and the safety of the others in the group.

Respect: acknowledging and collaborating with the leader, the group, and other road users.

Having fun: emphasizing the shared experience and camaraderie of riding together, while maintaining safety and respect.

Group riding is an active, constantly changing, and dynamic event. Conditions on the road are always in flux due to traffic, road conditions, actions from other users, and natural occurrences such as weather and animal activity. This requires a foundation of trust among the participants in the ride. Group riding does not excuse the rider from sound judgement or safe practices. Each rider is responsible for his own decisions, regardless of the group dynamic.

There are several ways each rider can provide the respect and consideration he expects from the others in the group. It is important to maintain lane position especially in tight turns and in traffic. Riders on the inside of a right-hand turn should try their best to stay on the right side of the road, especially when turning from a stop, as at an intersection. At stop signs and traffic lights, the group should collapse together, with each rider moving up next to the person ahead. Proper lane position will normally allow enough room for a bike and a trike to stop next to each other. Close formation at a stop allows the group to get through the intersection in less time, reducing the exposure of all the riders to cross traffic and left turning vehicles.

Remember that your actions have consequences. Every time you brake (for an obstacle or entering a turn), accelerate, or decelerate, you immediately affect ALL of the riders behind you. Any sudden action you make will require a sudden reaction from ALL of the other riders. Always do your best and signal your intentions well ahead to avoid causing panic among those riders who are following you.

Be aware of the differences in the vehicles in your group. Generally, if a vehicle participating in the group ride has less than three wheels, that vehicle will have a great deal of difficulty staying upright without rider input. And the slower that vehicle is moving, the more rider input is required. Group rides these days usually consist of more multi-wheeled vehicles than two-wheeled motorcycles. Many of the operators of these multi-wheeled vehicles were skilled riders of two wheels. Maybe this describes you. Do you remember riding on two wheels and the effort it took to keep the bike balanced and smooth during slow speed operation?

We all know we should ride our own ride, and we are responsible for our own actions. But this does not mean that you can do what you want without regard to the effects on other road users. We all have responsibility to each other when we interact on the highway, regardless of the setting. Using the highway is a privilege, not a right. Be respectful and patient so we all get along and arrive alive.
