View From The Saddle



I recently watched the Ken Burns special on the American Bison. Like everything Ken Burns does, it was very well done. To realize how close we came to losing such a magnificent animal is scary. Of course, as you may remember from an earlier View From The Saddle, SCARY is seeing a charging cow buffalo when you're sitting on a motorcycle with no escape route. That's where Jennie and I found ourselves while riding the Wildlife Loop in Custer State Park in South Dakota many years ago. As you may recall, I swung the bike to the left hoping on hope that the cow would stop her charge but she caught the back of the bike knocking us off the road and down thru sagebrush and rocks where we went down. Fortunately, the cow had made her point and returned to the herd instead of continuing her attack. With the help of strangers, we got the bike back up on the road, gathered our bike pieces off the ground and wrapped my bleeding hand, our only injury.

I guess we were lucky that it wasn't a bear that wanted to eat us, but being struck by a 6' tall charging buffalo is exciting enough, thank you very much. Like so many things in life, it could have been much worse and we're still thankful that a cut on the back of my hand was our only injury.

Wildlife can present a danger to us any where and any time. Dan mentioned deer hazards being especially high this month. Deer will soon be in the rut and that changes their normal activities from fairly predictable to wildly unpredictable. Bucks are running does day and night and watching out for traffic is not on their minds now thru mid-December. I suspect all of us have had a close encounter with a deer while riding. And if you see one deer cross the road in front of you, ignore it and look for deer number 2 or number 3 because there is usually more than one.

I was riding in the Texas Hill Country with my brother and as he topped a hill he found a road kill that a group of turkey vultures were feeding on. As they flew from him, one buzzard was in a hurry to get back to breakfast and flew right in front of me as I crested the hill. Fortunately, we missed each other. A buzzard is a big bird and I think the worst that might have happened would have been a broken windshield or some other plastic part but you never know. I'm just glad he made it safely back to his meal and I avoided a collision.

It wouldn't take a buffalo to cause you to go down, if you're on 2 wheels, that is. Even a dog or coyote, maybe even a large raccoon, could ruin your day. We must do our best to keep from hitting anything while we're riding. You can improve your odds of avoiding a collision by not riding after dark, if at all possible. Many animals are nocturnal plus you're visibility is limited to what you can see in your headlights.

So as we enter the fall riding season, be mindful of any hazard that you may encounter: rutting deer, farm machinery, wet leaves, dogs that aren't paying attention and any number of other things that could spoil your ride. This is a great time of year to be riding. Just be a little more aware right now and you can enjoy all that the fall season has to offer.
