Rider Education Report



For my last article for 2023, I thought I would share some technical information about lithium, a chemical element of the alkali metal group that is the lightest metal known and one that is used especially in alloys and glass, in mechanical lubricants, and in storage batteries. In the periodic table, its symbol is Li, its atomic weight is 6.939, its atomic number is 3, and its specific gravity is 0.53 at 20°C.

Lithium is the 33rd most abundant element on Earth, but it does not naturally occur in its pure form due to its high reactivity. Lithium metal, due to its alkaline properties, is corrosive and reacts with water. Breathing lithium dust or alkaline lithium compounds irritates respiratory tracts. Prolonged exposure to lithium can cause nervous system disorders, and it can cause fluid to build-up in the lungs, leading to pulmonary edema. The metal itself is a handling hazard because of the caustic hydroxide produced when it is in contact with water, which can cause an explosion.

There are three sources of lithium: underground mines, surface clay, recycling, and brine water. 87 percent of the world's lithium comes from the brine water, with the highest lithium concentrations found in Bolivia, Argentina, and Chile.

Lithium mining carries high environmental costs. Mining companies operating in the salt plains of South America, which are essentially high deserts, require extensive extraction operations and use nearly two-thirds of the available fresh water, leaving very little for farming and livestock.

The smallest currently available source of lithium is that contained in recycled electronics. While lithium recycling is not yet capable of yielding material pure enough for reuse in batteries, it can be used in glass and ceramics, the second-largest lithium-consuming industry after the manufacturing of lithium-ion batteries.


